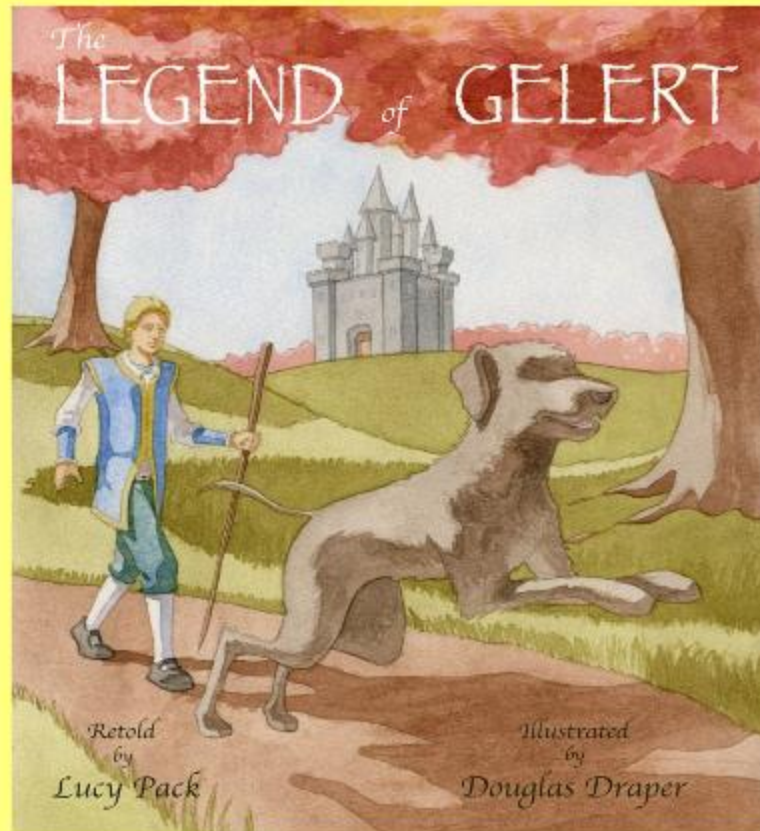

noun

relative clause goes after the noun

Llewelyn was a prince.

Gelert

Using the examples below as a place to begin, write complex sentences for the main clause examples and insert a relative clause within or at the end.

The Prince lived in a castle.

Prince Llewelyn had a hound called Gelert.

The Prince loved his son.

He left his baby in a cradle.

Llewelyn beheld a terrible sight as he entered the room.

He drew his dagger and plunged it deep into Gelert.

Gelert's body was buried outside of the castle walls.

Think about experimenting with your sentences and placing the relative clause at the end and within the sentence.

How does this affect the sentence?
