Macbeth Key Writing Skills

L.O. To use a semi-colon to join clauses of equal weight. Semicolons

A semicolon can be used in place of a connective to link two main clauses which are of equal importance.

Example: The film was brilliant, therefore we had a great time.

The film was brilliant; we had a great time.

The murderer appeared at the back door he had come to tell Macbeth that Banquo was dead.
