

Brasília was built in the shape of a plane or flying bird. You can see this shape from the air.





Brasilia is the capital of Brazil. Rio used to be the capital, but in the 1950s, the government decided the capital should be nearer the centre of our huge country. Brasília was built in just four years and opened in 1960. It including a cathedral shaped like a spiky crown.

Brazil is a beautiful country with many different landscapes. Rainforests, wetlands, grassy plains and coasts all have their own wildlife.

## Mighty river

The Amazon is the world's second-longest river. It flows right across Brazil to the Atlantic Ocean. The mouth of the river is very wide. The Amazon contains more water than any other river in the world.

A boat floats down the wide Amazon River.




## Rainforest

Candomblé a Brazilian religion that is based on African beliefs

capital city where the country's government meets

climate the regular weather pattern in a region

colony a territory ruled by another country

favela a Brazilian word for a slum

festival a celebration, usually for religious reasons

float a decorated vehicle that carries people in a parade

**Lent** the forty days before Easter

manioc a root crop that is also known as cassava



Middle East an area that covers southeast Asia and northwest Africa

mining digging out materials, such as coal or precious metals, from the ground

official language the main language of a country that is approved by the government

plain an area of low, flat land plantation a large farm where crops, such as coffee, rubber or sugar cane are grown.

rodent a type of small mammal with large, sharp front teeth; mice, rats and hamsters are rodents

samba a Brazilian dance

sugar cane a tropical grass from which sugar is made

tropical belonging to the tropics, the area around the Equator
